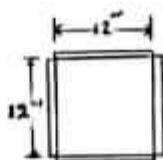
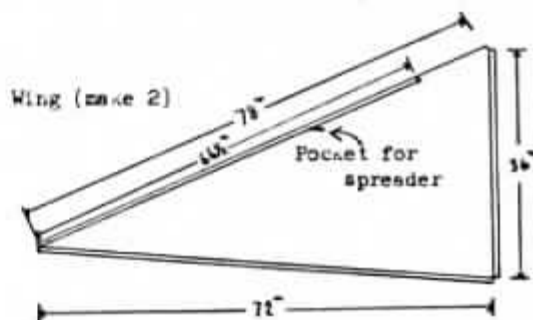
Kite Hospital and Flutter Bag assembly spot

MODIFIED "HARDEC"

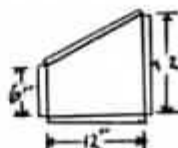
John White's High-Aspect-Ratio Delta-Coyne ("Hardec") was Kite Lines' Design Workshop feature in its Summer-Fall, '81 issue. Kevin fitted it with cells designed by Curtis and Gray Marshall and with a nylon-rod spreader bar, and came up with a kite that has a phenomenal 3-to-40 mph wind range. He's flown it in gale-force winds on the ocean beaches, and says the key to that is the flexibility of the spreader.

The longerons are 1/4" dowels; they fit into sleeves made from the margins of the cell pieces. Wing sticks and spreader bar are 1/4" nylon rod (no longer available here; try fiberglass). The spreader bar is approximately the same length as the wing sticks; it fits across the kite at the bottom of the forward cell.

The 2-point bridle is attached near the top of each cell.

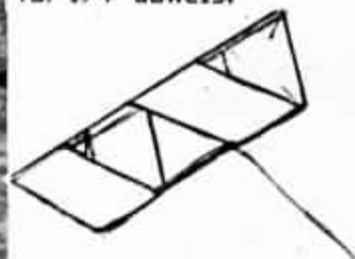


Cell back

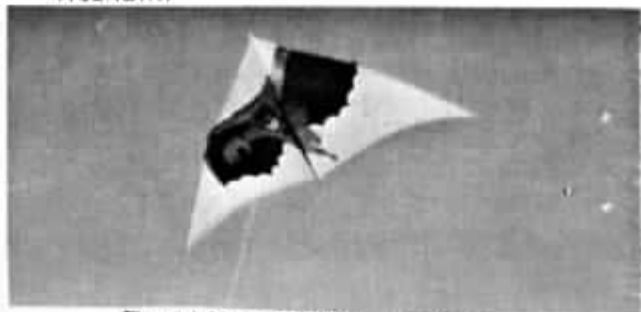

Its original spreader bar got broken and has been replaced with a dowel, fastened by buttons and rubber bands.
