KITE CLUB MEETING:

April 27 at 7:30 p.m.:
 Science Center -- Subjects: plans for future, kite movies and slides. Important meeting! Mark the date!!

A report on the Seattle Center contest, March 27th: First Prize: Gary Strodtz had 28 out of a possible 30 points with his nylon ripstop multi-colored winged box kite with a tail at least 30 feet long. \$50 will buy quite a bit of rip-stop. Second Prize: went to a young fellow by the name of Steven Arnett who had a well-designed high-flier of orange material of triangular, keeled, delta-wing configuration with a nice fringed tail. Third Prize: went to Jack Van Gilder with his newest edition of a Northwest Indian design of a Thunderbird made of tyvek and rip-stop on a delta chassis. Steve and Jack both had 27 points. Ten points were awarded for "Flight Performance", "Beauty", and for "Craftsmanship". Thanks much to judges Dave Checkley, John Dusenberry and Jim Carnwath. The rain held off just long enough. The kite-eating trees at the Center had their fill! The crowd like the most-familiar kite in the Northwest; Bill Spezia's "Hermie, the Friendly Bat". The next day a smaller crowd was on hand for a kite fighting demonstration. Bruce Kimball, who works at the kite shop, VanGilder and another fellow were all cut down by Bill Fung. Bill says that he learned to handle a fighter kite in his youth in Hong Kong. The Fun Forest at

the Seattle Center again provided the prize: \$20 cash. You would think that more people would try for a prize of that size, right?

Science Center Exposition, March 13 and 14 saw many hard-working members. Ken Conrad, with his broken arm barely healed, spent most of both days helping people make small cobra kites at 50 cents each. Tom Sisson's design for a garbage bag sled kite went for 25 cents and also like hotcakes. Bill Lee and Harold Writer must have helped 100 kids each with them. A new-member couple (my memory for names is deteriorating with age) had this activity organized all over the floor of the balcony when we ran out of table-top space. Great! It seemed as though people were most awed at the indoor flying of the little tissue paper deltas in the Eames Theater. The "bottom line" was the number of paid admissions over the number last year. We shared these with the Science Center to the tune of \$484.

Speaking of flying kites indoors: Guess who holds the record for flying the first kite indoors at the new Kingdome Stadium? A small tissue paper delta went up to the loudspeakers, almost to the ceiling, before running out of flying room. Don't be too surprised if us WKAers wind up putting on a demonstration during the half-time of some football game there!
