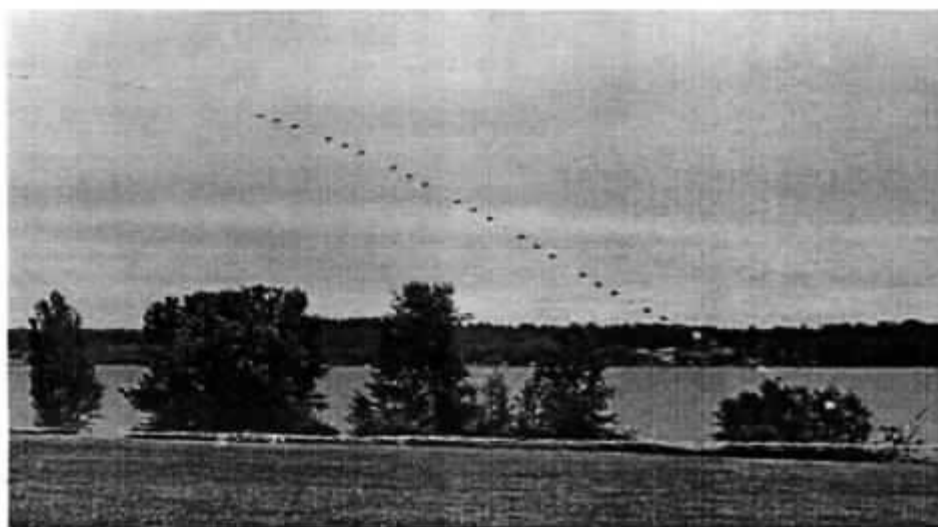

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SECOND ANNUAL MOSES LAKE KITE FESTIVAL

Wildwood!!! WSIKF!!! Berkley!!! SBBB!!! Nationals!!! Smithsonian!!! Kite Party!!! Newport!!! KOI!!! All major Kite Festivals, right? Okay, I left some out. And I didn't mention the hundreds of other regional and local kite-fests that dot the calendar every weekend from now through Labor Day and beyond...

So what do you do if you're just a "little guy" and you'd like to start a festival in your own hometown? Well, shoot, folks – my advice is simple: GO FOR THE GUSTO! Get out, get organized, use all the resources of your community, and put on the best darned kite festival you can manage! And make real sure you name it the "FIRST Annual..." too!

Consider, if you will, the efforts of the Basin Kitefliers Association (BKA) of Moses Lake, Washington – all half dozen of 'em. Yep, just a handful really, and Moses Lake only claims a population of fifteen thousand souls, give or take a few. But the BKA puts on a dandy kite festival anyway. I know – I'm wearing their sweet tee shirt right now – and you can bet your kite bag I'll be there in 2004 for the Third Annual Moses Lake Kite Festival too.

The Moses Lake Kite Festival(s) are really the brainchild and labor of love of a kite pilot named Bill Walton, who moved to town and bought a flower shop. "What? Clear skies, plenty of wind – and NO KITES? How can this be?" So Bill set out to "fix it!" And he's done a bang-up job. We missed his "First Annual" due to a schedule conflict, but we made it to the "Second." And I'm sure glad we did. What a delight!

By the way, the "we" in this saga is my kite-fest traveling partner, Charly Whitaker, and I. Charly's the President of the Washington Kitefliers Association, and I'm one of his business partners. We happen to share a passion for kiting, and collect old "antique" kites as a hobby. We also travel to a fair number of the local festivals, showing the WKA flag so to speak, and helping the organizers where we can. Charly's your on-call ad hoc fest announcer at lots of these functions, and I just hang out, meet a few folks, take a few pics, do a little write-up for the newsletter, and fly a few antique kites. It's lots of fun.

We rolled into Moses Lake on Friday afternoon, and called the floral shop for further directions, and you just have to know they "Told Us Where To Go" (story of my life, right there). Still, our assigned motel was convenient, clean and comfy. We weren't in the room a half hour before Bill Walton showed up to make sure we were treated properly. Egad! "Personalized Service" no less. Not to worry, though – it was a nice place, and had plenty of decent restaurants nearby. What more could you want? Charly and Bill agreed on tomorrow's start times and split up the day's announcing chores, and we also got a good recommendation for an eating establishment. Little did we know that Bill would shuffle other out-of-town kites to the same place, so we shared a table with Neal and Annette Parker, talked kiting most of the evening, and ended the night stringing Dacron Single Line Kite (SLK) line up and down the street to make lines to fly display kites on Saturday before heading off to bed.

The morning broke with considerable overcast, but NO rain, and PLENTY of kite-flying wind! The festival flying field was really the athletic practice area behind Moses Lake High School, and it is HUGE!!! Think of 10-12 soccer fields side-by-side. In addition, there were NO trees up wind that we could see. Moreover, someone (Bill) had even done a fair amount of thinking, because the festival booths were all huddled straight DOWNwind from the demo fields. Geez, it's NICE to have a pilot as an organizer!

I finally got enough coffee in me to get out there with my camera – just in time to see "Team Centrifugal Force" take to the demo field with their California Wasps. Centrifugal Force used to compete on the circuit, but got pretty tired of that gone-every-weekend schedule. Now they attend the festivals of their choice, and just fly demos. Dan Brown and his uncle, Kerry Haines, fly pairs together, and if you've not seen 'em fly, you've really missed something kinda special. Consider Wagner's "Ride of the Valkyries" in the hand of consummate kite ballet artists – flying those wonderful California Wasps. Yeah – you get the idea. And these two really DO know their stuff. Never mind any more coffee – Team Centrifugal Force will wake you up and get you going in fine style!

Then Jeff Reed from the big town of Monroe, Washington (another "big" town about 175 miles away from Moses Lake) took to the demo field with his gorgeous Classic Illusion – towing a huge multi-colored tube-tail. While he'll try and tell you that his flying's nothing special, you couldn't prove it by the crowd's reaction. He "WOW'd" 'em. I saw plenty of kids trying to count the number of loops Jeff put into that tube-tail at one time, and there were more than a few who thought Jeff was the real highlight of the whole darned festival! Such fun!

Yup, Neal and Annette Parker also did a few demos too. They're pretty darned handy with a TOTL North Shore Radical (NSR), and that Neal is certainly no slouch as a stunt pilot, either. If you've never seen an NSR flown, you're probably not quite ready for the "NSR Roar" when one's flown in your vicinity – say, like within the same county. Yes, they're loud kites (or, should I say "LOUD!!!"). They're also extremely precise kites, and

2 just a joy to fly. Well, Neal is someone who definitely knows his way around an NSR, and he happily showed

us his (and the kite's) prowess. Annette, on the other hand, was equally happy to show us some REV flying throughout the weekend, and she always took time to answer questions and give a few quiet lessons. Thanks, Annette!

As the day progressed, there were lots of activities for all participants. Families and children showed up at the registration booths and made their own sled kites, of course. The display kites were out for all to see, and the owners/tenders chatted with those who'd come to see the show. Demos continued throughout the day too, and a fair number of local kids and adults stood in lines to fly the demo kites and take a short lesson.

Sunday broke bright and clear, and the Weather Channel at the motel promised SW winds at 6-10 mph - and warmer temps, too. After a run past the espresso stand across from the motel, we headed for the flying field and another great day of Kite Festival!

Yep, we did the same old stuff! "Same Old?" Yes, but, then again, "NOT QUITE..."

You see, Sunday was the day for INDOOR flying as well as the traditional outdoor stuff! So Charly took his mike to the High School gym, and your old correspondent hovered outdoors and just hung with the crowd. (All right, I flew an old Prism Eclipse for a while, if that means anything to anyone?)

Apparently, the Indoor fly was a resounding success for the spectators. Charly reports that they probably had 100 spectators for the indoor fly - which is pretty darned good! But it was just plain exhausting for the participants - all three (3) of them. Fortunately, the three demo fliers displayed completely different flying styles.

If Penny Lingenfelter is a delight outdoors, she's just superb as an indoor pilot. Her specialty is quad-line Ballet with her Revolutions, and she takes your breath away with her marvelous routines.

Jeff Reed flies "fighter" kites indoors. They're hand-made, single-line, controllable kites - used OUTdoors in kite competitions or "fights," hence the name. It's simply amazing to watch someone keep a single line kite in the air indoors, and Jeff is no slouch at it, either.

And Craig Lyle, up from Walla Walla, flies the traditional dual-line indoor stunters. His "kite of choice" for the day was an Indoor Ultralight kite named the "Sweetie" which is made in Germany.

Yep! The day was settling in pretty well. Coffee in the jug, sun's out, wind's up, and temps're "moderate" (finally).

Finally, all the spectators and participants reached the end - all "kited out!" It wasn't an abrupt ending though - just kind of a "consensus" thing. So mid-afternoon saw most of us shutting down, packing up and pulling out - headed over mountain passes or desert highways toward our home, a hot meal, and a welcome pillow. A few started leaving about 2:30 and I think we were maybe the last to leave at 4:00 pm. Saying "Bye Til Next Time" is always a bittersweet thing... Yeah, we'll see you soon, and we'll come to THIS one again, too! This one's kinda special... So, finally, we shook Bill Walton's hand one more time, said "Congratulations Bill - Helluva festival - YOU DID IT!!!" and headed for the barn ourselves.

Yeah, the "Second Annual Moses Lake Kite Festival" was over. And it was a resounding success! And, yes, it was kinda SPECIAL!

Why was it special?

Well, most kite-fests are filled with high-intensity activity. Competitions and demos and activities and vendors run simultaneously. This Moses Lake festival was filled with gentle, slow, relaxed delights. Most kite-fests are jam-packed on a small patch of beach. Structures and equipment and vehicles and the ever-present "officials" crowd the people. The Moses Lake fly had more than enough field room for everyone. Most kite-fests exist in almost a "carnival" atmosphere. Buy-My-Kite and Watch-The-Show and AnotherDog-WhatDaYaWantOnIt? all together. The Moses Lake fest thrived in a laid-back, share with your friends atmosphere.

Want to RELAX and actually ENJOY kiting? See you at the "Third Annual Moses Lake Kite Festival" next year...!

And - YES - you can put on your own kite festival if you want - if you REALLY want. But don't believe that just because I said so! Ask Bill Walton instead... (Bill@mfloral.com)

The 1st annual Windless Kites Festival Article by Scott Davis

I never imagined that my humble attempt to put together an indoor kite festival in Long Beach Washington would lead to the feelings that rushed through me as the last few demos played out Sunday afternoon. It was more than just an intense feeling of awe.

Immediately after the Hot Trick Shoot-out, John Barresi flew with stellar "Barresi" style, Jerry Cannon flew with all of his smooth, classy essence, and Penny Lingenfelter awed us and basically closed the weekend with a heart warming ballet to "America the Beautiful". As these guys flew their demos I had a real sense that we had been here for a reason... Yes, the Northwest does have some excellent indoor talent and we are ready to start having some indoor competitions on a regular basis.

It was three months ago that I decided to get hold of Kay Buesing of the World Kite Museum in Long Beach about this festival. I explained that I wanted to do more than just the competition. I wanted an indoor kite "festival". Kay and I tossed around a few ideas and decided that we had better get started. I wanted this event to be a fund-raiser for the museum as well. We planned a Potluck dinner for Saturday night that included the awards ceremony for the competition, some time for announcements, and a raffle. As it turned out, the raffle was a huge success. I even ended up without my shirt that night. It was also auctioned off for the museum fund-raiser.

Kay acquired the elementary school gym for a full week-end., we were there setting up and flying Friday afternoon until 10:00 that night and each morning we were back in the gym at 8:00. There was plenty of free flying time. The walls of the gym were decorated with banners, kites, and windsocks. It worked, the feeling of a "festival" was there. I contacted the fighter kite gang to join us, as well. Their presence certainly added to the event. They flew some demos and one of them even competed. Flyers were practicing for the competition and others were trying indoor flying for the first time.

The first competition was the Indoor Ballet on Saturday afternoon. Bill Rogers was the head judge, with Marcia Cannon and Al Councilman judging as well. The pilot's meeting went well. Bill went over the boundaries and the indoor rules... For most of us, this was our first indoor competition. As the competition was about to begin, the bleachers filled with spectators. By the time the competition started, the energy in the air was intense. Six of us signed up to compete, and compete we did. Indoor Ballet is such a beautiful thing to watch. Seeing the kite, the flyer, and the music become a ballet was what turned the competition into a show for the crowd.
